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1. Statement of intent

At St Bede's, we are committed to providing a transformative Catholic education that empowers pupils to serve the common good by living the values of Faith, Hope and Love. Central to this vision is the development of the whole person. Through our curriculum, we promote the spiritual, moral, physical and intellectual growth of each child according to their individual needs and stage of development.

We recognise that relationships are fundamental to human flourishing and are especially significant for the young people in our care, who are at a formative stage of personal growth. The quality of relationships experienced in school is therefore central to all that we do.

All staff share with parents and parishes the responsibility for fostering the spiritual and moral development of our pupils. Our approach to RSHE reflects the values of our Catholic community and is consistent, coherent, and rooted in the school's Mission Statement.

At St Bede's, we uphold our mission within the wider life of the Church, following the **teaching and guidance of the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales** and the **Archdiocese of Liverpool**. This policy is informed by the **1993 Education Act, Circular 5/94, Sex and Relationships Guidance (2000), the Bishops' Conference response (2000), the Equality Act (2010), and the statutory guidance on Relationships, Sex and Health Education (July 2025)**.

Statement of Policy

This policy sets out the school's approach to Relationships and Sex Education (RSE), developed within the framework of our Catholic Mission. It has been informed by extensive consultation with the school community, which is a key principle of this policy.

Consultation included:

- **Pupils:** through a working party, pupil voice sessions, and small group discussions
- **Parents:** via the parent voice group
- **Staff:** including teachers responsible for RSE delivery
- **School Nurse:** professional input on health and wellbeing
- **Governors:** review and approval

Christian responsibility in relationships is at the heart of our provision, and parents of prospective pupils are expected to consider this when choosing a Catholic education at our school.

This policy aligns with our Mission Statement:

"I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me, with me in him, bears fruit in plenty." (John 15:5)

We aim to help pupils achieve a fullness of life, a positive sense of self, and personal wellbeing by placing Jesus' teaching and example at the centre of their lives, guiding their choices, aspirations, and relationships. Inspired by Jesus' promise of an abundant life (John 10:10), our holistic curriculum provides opportunities for spiritual, moral, social, and cultural development, with ongoing reflection on these themes throughout their five years at school.

Implementation: This policy will be implemented following consultation with the **Governing Body** in Term 1, 2025.

Review: The policy will be reviewed **annually** by the **Headteacher, RSE Co-ordinator, staff, and Governing Body** to ensure it remains effective and compliant with statutory guidance.

Next Review Date: November 2026

Dissemination

The draft policy will be shared with all members of the Governing Body and all teaching and non-teaching staff. Copies will be made available to parents through the school prospectus and can be consulted in the school office.

Details of the RSE curriculum content will also be published on the school's website.

3. Relationships and Sex Education Description of Practice

At St Bede's, Relationships and Sex Education (RSHE) forms part of a whole school approach to Personal Development, firmly rooted in the values and teachings of the Catholic Church. RSHE is delivered through a cross-curricular programme, carefully planned to ensure learning is age-appropriate, balanced, and relevant.

Our programme is designed to complement the role of parents and carers as pupils grow into adulthood. It affirms Catholic teachings on marriage and family life, while providing opportunities to address the needs of students from a Christian perspective in a world with varying pressures and values.

RSHE promotes the development of knowledge, understanding, and skills that enable pupils to make well-informed decisions, show respect for themselves and others, and build loving, lasting relationships. The dignity of the human person is at the heart of planning and delivery, ensuring the subject is taught in the appropriate moral and spiritual context.

Objectives

The main objectives for our relationships and sex education policy are as follows:

Context

Promote Catholic values and healthy relationships

- Emphasise the uniqueness of human love and the sanctity of marriage through the promotion of healthy relationships and lifestyles.
- Contextualise teaching within the pressures faced by young people in an increasingly secular society.
- Provide a safe, secure, and positive environment where pupils can discuss fears and anxieties, ask questions, and receive reassurance.

- Impart Catholic values so pupils grow in character and virtue, enabling them to make healthy, life-long decisions.

Develop knowledge and understanding

- Emphasise the importance of sex within marriage and the dignity of the human person in relationship-based decisions.
- Ensure all pupils receive statutory RSHE in the context of Catholic teaching.
- Prepare pupils for physical and emotional changes at puberty, supporting them to manage adolescent challenges.
- Provide accurate information about sexual health, empowering pupils to keep themselves and others safe.
- Explore ethical issues in a faith context to support well-informed decision-making.

Skill development

- Raise awareness of unhealthy relationships and habits, promoting responsible choices.
- Raise awareness of protected characteristics, empowering pupils to oppose actions that undermine dignity.
- Develop empathy-focused communication skills to help pupils express feelings and values effectively.
- Support the development of a positive self-image and self-esteem, fostering discernment and safe relationship choices.
- Promote authentic freedom and individuality, helping pupils resist societal and peer pressure while valuing themselves.
- Build confidence so pupils can seek help and support when needed.

4.Roles and responsibilities

The governing board is responsible for:

- Ensuring all pupils make progress in achieving the expected educational outcomes.
- Ensuring the RSHE curriculum is well-led, effectively managed and well-planned.
- Evaluating the quality of provision through regular and effective self-evaluation.
- Ensuring that teaching is delivered in ways that are accessible to all pupils with SEND.
- Providing clear information to parents on the subject content and the right to request that their child is withdrawn.
- Ensuring RSHE and health education is resourced, staffed and timetabled in a way that ensures the school can fulfil its legal obligations.
- Maintaining and developing the Catholic ethos of the school.

The headteacher is responsible for:

- The overall implementation of this policy.
- Ensuring all staff are suitably trained to deliver the subjects.
- Ensuring parent are fully informed of this policy.
- Reviewing all requests to withdraw pupils from non-statutory elements of the RSHE curriculum.
- Discussing withdrawal requests with parents, and the child if appropriate, to ensure their wishes are understood and to clarify the nature and purpose of the curriculum, including the benefits of receiving the education.
- Ensuring withdrawn pupils receive appropriate, purposeful education during the period of withdrawal.
- Encouraging parents to be engaged with the school's RSHE curriculum.
- Reviewing this policy on an **annual** basis.
- Reporting to the governing board on the effectiveness of this policy and the curriculum.

The Assistant Headteacher (Personal Development & Catholic Life) responsible for:

- Overseeing the delivery of RSHE and health education.

- Ensuring our RSHE and health education delivery adheres to Catholic teachings and under the direction of the Archdiocese.
- Working closely with colleagues in related curriculum areas to ensure the RSHE and health education curriculum compliments, and does not duplicate, the content covered in national curriculum subjects.
- Ensuring the curriculum is age-appropriate and of high-quality.
- Reviewing changes to the RSHE and health education curriculum and advising on their implementation.
- Monitoring the learning and teaching of RSHE and health education, providing support to staff where necessary.
- Ensuring the continuity and progression between each year group.
- Helping to develop colleagues' expertise in the subject.
- Ensuring teachers are provided with adequate resources to support teaching of the curriculum.
- Ensuring the school meets its statutory requirements in relation to RSHE and health education.
- Leading staff meetings and ensuring all members of staff involved in the curriculum have received the appropriate training.
- Organising, providing and monitoring CPD opportunities in the subject.
- Ensuring the correct standards are met for recording and assessing pupil performance.
- Monitoring and evaluating the effectiveness of the subjects and providing reports to the headteacher.

The DSL is responsible for:

- Offering advice and consultation for safeguarding-related subjects in the RSHE curriculum.
- Promoting knowledge and awareness of safeguarding issues amongst staff.
- Being an appropriate point of contact for staff who have concerns about the welfare of a child that have arisen through the teaching of RSHE.

Subject teachers are responsible for:

- Acting in accordance with, and promoting, this policy.
- Delivering RSHE in a sensitive way and that is of a high-quality and appropriate for each year group.
- Ensuring they do not express personal views or beliefs when delivering the curriculum.
- Planning lessons effectively, ensuring a range of appropriate teaching methods and resources are used to cover the content.
- Modelling positive attitudes to RSHE.
- Liaising with the SENCO about identifying and responding to the individual needs of pupils with SEND.
- Liaising with the Head of RE about key topics, resources and support for individual pupils.
- Monitoring pupil progress in RSE and health education.
- Reporting any concerns regarding the teaching of RSE or health education to the Head of RE or a member of the SLT.
- Reporting any safeguarding concerns or disclosures that pupils may make as a result of the subject content to the DSL.
- Responding appropriately to pupils whose parents have requested to withdraw them from the non-statutory components of RSHE, by providing them with alternative education opportunities.

The SENCO is responsible for:

- Advising teaching staff how best to identify and support pupils' individual needs.
- Advising staff on the use of TAs to meet pupils' individual needs.

5.A balanced curriculum

Whilst promoting Catholic values and virtues and teaching in accordance with Church teaching, we will ensure that pupils are offered a balanced programme by providing an RSE programme that offers a range of viewpoints on issues. Pupils will also receive clear scientific information as well as covering the aspects of the law pertaining to RSE (in secondary schools/academies relating to forced-marriage, female genital mutilation, abortion, the age of consent and legislation relating to equality). Knowing about facts and enabling young people to explore differing viewpoints is not the same as promoting behaviour and is not incompatible with our school's promotion of Catholic teaching. We will ensure that pupils have access to the learning they need to stay safe, healthy and understand their rights as individuals. (CES, 2025, p 5-6)

Organisation of the RSE curriculum

- All schools providing secondary education are required to deliver statutory RSE and all state-funded schools are required to deliver health education.
- For the purpose of this policy, **“relationships, sex and health education”** is defined as teaching pupils about developing healthy, nurturing relationships of all kinds, and helping them to understand human sexuality and to respect themselves and others.
- Aspects of the Health Education statutory curriculum (2025) is taught within the RSHE and Personal Development curriculum. The full overview of the Health Education curriculum can be found in the Personal Development and Ethos policy.
- The RSHE curriculum is continuously developed and reviewed in consultation with teachers, pupils and parents, and in accordance with DfE recommendations.
- We will gather the views of teachers, pupils and parents in the following ways:
 - Questionnaires
 - Parent and pupil forums
- The RSHE curriculum will be delivered through the Personal Development curriculum with some statutory elements taught via the science curriculum, RE curriculum and cross curricular themes. There are also two RSHE enrichment days, the retreat programme and form time resources also cover RSHE themes.
- The Assistant Headteacher, Personal Development and Catholic Life will work closely with their colleagues in related curriculum areas to ensure the curriculum complements and does not duplicate the content covered in national curriculum subjects.
- The curriculum has been developed in line with the DfE’s ‘Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex Education (RSHE) and Health Education’ guidance.
- The school will consider the context and views of the wider local community when developing the curriculum to ensure it is reflective of issues in the local area.
- The school will consider the religious background of all pupils when planning teaching, to ensure all topics included are appropriately handled.
- The RSHE curriculum is informed by topical issues in the school and wider community, to ensure it is tailored to pupils’ needs, for example, if there was a local prevalence of specific sexually transmitted infections, our curriculum would be tailored to address this issue.

6.RSHE Cross Curricular Overview

- **The school is free to determine an age-appropriate, developmental curriculum which meets the needs of young people and includes the statutory content outlined in this policy.**
- **The school makes available detailed curriculum overviews on the school website and all parents have access to the Ten Ten parent portal.**

What pupils will learn – Relationships and Sex Education

- Families: Understanding different family structures and the roles of family members.
- Respectful Relationships: Recognising and maintaining respectful relationships, including friendships and online interactions.
- Consent: Understanding the concept of consent in various contexts.
- Intimate and Sexual Relationships: Exploring the nature of intimate relationships and the importance of mutual respect.
- Sexual Health: Knowledge about sexual health, contraception, and sexually transmitted infections (STIs).
- Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation: Understanding and respecting diverse gender identities and sexual orientations.
- Sexual Violence and Harassment: Recognising and addressing sexual violence and harassment.
- Online Safety: Understanding the risks associated with online activities and how to stay safe.
- Female Genital Mutilation (FGM): Awareness of the risks and legal implications of FGM.
- Domestic Abuse: Recognising signs of domestic abuse and understanding the importance of healthy relationships.
- Grooming and Exploitation: Understanding the risks of grooming and exploitation.
- Pornography: Discussing the impact of pornography and recognising healthy sexual relationships.

What pupils will learn – Physical Health and Mental Wellbeing

- Mental Wellbeing: Understanding that mental wellbeing is a normal part of daily life, in the same way as physical health.
- Self-Regulation: Developing strategies to manage emotions, set goals, and respond to challenges.
- Healthy Lifestyles: Recognising the benefits of physical activity, good nutrition, and sufficient sleep.
- Resilience and Self-Efficacy: Building confidence in one's ability to achieve goals and persevere through setbacks.
- Seeking Support: Knowing how to seek help and advice when needed and understanding the importance of early intervention.
- Reducing Stigma: Promoting an atmosphere that encourages openness about mental health issues.
- Peer Support: Recognising the value of peer support networks in promoting mental wellbeing.

7.Delivery of the RSHE curriculum - controversial and sensitive issues

There will always be sensitive or controversial issues in the field of RSE. These may be matter of maturity, of personal involvement or experience of children, of disagreement with the official teaching of the Church, of illegal activity or other doubtful, dubious or harmful activity. The governors believe that children are best educated, protected from harm and exploitation by discussing such issues openly within the context of the RSE programme. The use of ground rules, negotiated between teachers and pupils, will help to create a supportive climate for discussion. (CES, 2025, p 7-8)

- The majority of the RSHE will be taught within the Personal Development curriculum. Here pupils will spend a half term developing knowledge and skills in line with statutory RSE curriculum.

- Science plays a key role in the teaching of statutory reproduction, sexual health and medicine and puberty. The Head of Science and Head of RE/ Associate Assistant Headteacher Personal Development and Ethos work closely to ensure that the cross curricular approach is both timely and complimentary.
- The new RED curriculum for RE does not include RSHE in years 7 and 8 so the RE curriculum is personalised to meet the needs of our pupils by providing RSE weeks for these year groups. In Year 9 and 11, students learn about RSE across a full term as part of the RED and GCSE specification.
- Form time prayer and reflection often covers healthy relationships and wellbeing issues related to RSE alongside pastoral assemblies linking to these themes.
- RSHE enrichment days take place in years 8 and 10. These days allow us to cover responsive content that is complementary to the needs of students at the school and in response to the needs of the local community.
- The St Bede's Retreat Programme compliments the RSHE curriculum through the development of character and virtues that we believe will give our students the necessary skills to form healthy relationships whilst also strengthening pupils' relationship with God so that they are able to make the right choices now and in the future.
- The RSHE curriculum will be delivered by appropriately trained, practicing Catholic members of staff who will complete annual Catholic RSE training in the delivery of RSHE.
- The governors want to promote a healthy, positive atmosphere in which RSE can take place. They want to ensure that pupils can ask questions freely, be confident that their questions will be answered, and be sure that they will be free from bullying or harassment from other children and young people. (CES, 2025, p 7)
- The curriculum will proactively address issues in a response manner, working closely with the Safeguarding and pastoral teams so that we are providing both a proactive and responsive provision to meet the current needs of pupils.
- RSHE will be delivered in a non-judgemental, age-appropriate, factual and inclusive way that allows pupils to ask questions in a safe environment.
- Teaching of the curriculum reflects requirements set out in law, particularly in the Equality Act 2010, so that pupils understand what the law does and does not allow, and the wider legal implications of the decisions they make.
- The curriculum considers changes in law such as the legal age of marriage and leaders of the RSE provision will ensure that resources are up to date and include legal and statutory change.
- In applying the Equality act of 2010 school will address in the curriculum the 7 protected characteristics (see below 13.1). This will include the integration LGBTQIA+ protected characteristic in content into the RSHE curriculum – this content will be taught as part of the overall curriculum, rather than a standalone topic or lesson. Content will be approached in a sensitive, age-appropriate and factual way that allows pupils to explore gender identity and sexuality. As a Catholic school, we will teach this subject as we are directed to by the Archdiocese. All pupils will know they are loved by God and no judgement will be made by any member of staff regarding their opinions or feelings on the matter. We are absolutely committed to ensuring that every child feels a treasured and valued member of our school community. As a school will promote acceptance and respect, through the acknowledgement of the inherent dignity of each person.
- All teaching and resources are assessed by the Assistant Headteacher to ensure they are appropriate for the age and maturity of pupils, are sensitive to their religious backgrounds and meet the needs of any SEND, if applicable.
- Classes may be taught in gender-segregated groups dependent on the nature of the topic being delivered at the time. The vast majority of RSHE learning takes place in mixed gender groups.
- Resources will be selected with sensitivity given to the age, cultural and religious background of pupils.
- RSHE ground rules are explained at the beginning of all RSHE lessons and 'distancing' techniques, and use of appropriate language and communication is explained so that learning takes place in an appropriate setting.
- Pupils will be prevented from accessing inappropriate materials on the internet when using such to assist with their learning. The prevention measures taken to ensure this are outlined in the school's E-safety Policy, and Acceptable Terms of Use Agreement.
- Teachers will ensure that pupils' views are listened to and will encourage them to ask questions and engage in discussion. Teachers will answer questions sensitively and honestly.
- The curriculum is gender balanced and planned to ensure all genders are actively involved, matching their different learning styles. Case studies, real-life examples and resources are carefully selected so that they promote inclusivity and diversity.
- Teachers will focus heavily on the importance of marriage and healthy long-term relationships when teaching RSE, though sensitivity will always be given, and we acknowledge that pupils come from a variety of backgrounds.
- Teachers will ensure lesson plans focus on challenging perceived views of pupils based on protected characteristics, through exploration of, and developing mutual respect for, those different to themselves.

- In teaching the curriculum, teachers will be aware that pupils may communicate in a way that would be deemed as a wellbeing and/ or safeguarding concern. When talking about these topics in lessons, teachers are aware of the school safeguarding policy and procedures and will activate this if necessary.

8. Working with parents

The school understands that parents' role in the development of their children's understanding about relationships and health is vital. The school will work closely with parents when planning and delivering the content of the school's RSHE curriculum. When in consultation with parents, the school will provide:

- The curriculum content, including what will be taught and when via termly emails and the school website.
- Examples of the resources the school intends to use to deliver the curriculum.
- At the points of delivery of the curriculum, parental engagement will be sort. Parents will be informed of the content of the curriculum within five working days of the first lesson via email and the school Wellbeing and Ethos newsletter.
- Parents are given access to the Ten Ten parent portal so that they can view the resources that we use and seek further support and information about discussing RSE topics at home.
- Information about parents' right to withdraw their child from non-statutory elements of RSE and health education.
- Parents will be provided with frequent opportunities to understand and ask questions about the school's approach to RSE education during parent forum meetings.
- The school understands that the teaching of some aspects of the curriculum may be of concern to parents.
- If parents have concerns regarding RSHE and health education, they may submit these via email to admin@sbchs.co.uk, or contact the school office to arrange a meeting with the headteacher on 01695 570 335.

9. Working with external agencies

- Working with external agencies can enhance our delivery of RSHE, and brings in specialist knowledge and different ways of engaging pupils.
- External experts may be invited to assist from time-to-time with the delivery of the RSHE and health education curriculum but will be expected to comply with the provisions of this policy and Archdiocese guidelines in relation to working with external agencies.
- The school will seek advice from the Archdiocese of Liverpool education department when considering working with external agencies to enhance RSHE.
- The school will check the visitor/visiting organisation's credentials of all external agencies.
- The school will ensure the teaching delivered by the external experts fits with the planned curriculum and provisions of this policy.
- The school will discuss with the visitor the details of how they intend to deliver their sessions and ensure the content is age-appropriate and accessible for all pupils.
- The school will request copies of the materials and lesson plans the visitor will use, to ensure it meets the full range of pupils' needs.
- The school and the visitor will agree on how confidentiality will work in any lesson and that the visitor understands how safeguarding reports must be dealt with in line with the school's Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy.
- The school will use visitors to enhance teaching by an appropriate member of teaching staff, not to replace teaching by those staff.

10. Withdrawal from lessons

- Parents have the right to request that their child is withdrawn from some or all of sex education delivered as part of statutory RSHE.
- Parents **do not** have a right to withdraw their child from the reproduction or health elements of the programmes.
- Requests to withdraw a child from sex education will be made in writing to the headteacher.

- Before granting a withdrawal request, the headteacher will discuss the request with the parents and, as appropriate, the child, to ensure their wishes are understood and to clarify the nature and purpose of the curriculum.
- The headteacher will inform parents of the benefits of their child receiving RSHE and any detrimental effects that withdrawal might have.
- All discussions with parents will be documented. These records will be kept securely in the school office in line with the school's Records Management Policy.
- Following discussions with parents, the school will respect the parents' request to withdraw their child up to and until three terms before the child turns 16. After this point, if the child wishes to receive RSHE rather than be withdrawn, the school will make arrangements to provide the child with RSHE. Pupils who are withdrawn from RSHE will receive appropriate, purposeful education during the full period of withdrawal.
- For requests concerning the withdrawal of a pupil with SEND, the headteacher may take the pupils' specific needs into account when making their decision.

11. Equality and accessibility

The school will comply with the relevant requirements of the Equality Act 2010 and will ensure the curriculum does not discriminate against pupils because of their:

Age
Sex
Race
Disability
Religion or belief
Gender reassignment
Pregnancy or maternity
Marriage or civil partnership
Sexual orientation

- The school will consider the backgrounds, gender, age range and needs of its pupils and determine whether it is necessary to put in place additional support for pupils with the above protected characteristics.
- The school understands that pupils with SEND are entitled to learn about RSE and health education, and the curriculum will be designed to be inclusive of all pupils.
- The school is aware that some pupils are more vulnerable to exploitation, bullying and other issues due to the nature of their SEND – teachers will understand that they may need to liaise with the SENCO and be more explicit and adapt their planning or work to appropriately deliver the curriculum to pupils with SEND.
- Where there is a need to tailor content and teaching to meet the needs of pupils at different developmental stages, the school will ensure the teaching remains sensitive, age-appropriate, developmentally appropriate and is delivered with reference to the law.
- The school will take steps to foster healthy and respectful peer-to-peer communications and provide an environment which challenges perceived limits on pupils based on their gender or any other characteristic.
- The school will be actively aware of everyday issues such as sexism, misogyny, homophobia and gender stereotypes and take positive action to build a culture within which these are not tolerated. Any occurrences of such issues will be identified and tackled promptly.
- The school will make clear that sexual violence and sexual harassment are not acceptable and will not be tolerated. Any reports of sexual violence or sexual harassment will be handled in accordance with the school's behaviour policy.

12. Safeguarding and confidentiality

- All pupils will be taught about keeping themselves safe, including online, as part of a broad and balanced curriculum.
- To meet DfE best practice advice, the DSL will be involved in the formulation of safeguarding-related areas of the curriculum, as the knowledge and resources may help to address safeguarding issues more appropriately and effectively.

- When teaching issues that are particularly sensitive for pupils of all ages, e.g. self-harm or suicide, teachers will be made aware of the risks of inadvertently encouraging, or providing instructions to, pupils. Teaching of these subjects will always prioritise preventing self-harm or suicide as a central goal.
- Confidentiality within the classroom is an important component of RSHE and teachers are expected to respect the confidentiality of their pupils as far as is possible.
- Teachers will, however, understand that some aspects of RSHE may lead to a pupil raising a safeguarding concern, and that if a disclosure is made, the DSL will be alerted immediately.
- Pupils will be made aware of how to raise their concerns or make a report, and how their report will be handled – this includes the process for when they have a concern about a peer.

13.Assessment

- The school has the same high expectations of the quality of pupils' work in RSHE and as for other curriculum areas.
- Lessons are planned to provide suitable challenge to pupils of all abilities.
- Learning will be formatively assessed to identify where pupils need extra support or intervention.
- There are no formal examinations for RSHE education; however, to assess pupil outcomes, the school will capture progress in the following ways:

Retrieval formative assessments

Case study formative assessments

Self-learning evaluations

14.Staff training

- Training will be provided by the Head of RE/ Associate Assistant Headteacher Personal Development and Ethos to the relevant members of staff on a termly basis to ensure they are up to date with the RSHE curriculum.
- Training will also be scheduled around any updated guidance on the curriculum and any new developments which may need to be addressed in relation to the curriculum.
- The school will ensure teachers receive training on and the role of an effective RSHE curriculum in reducing the number of teenage conceptions.
- Appropriately trained staff will be able to give pupils information on where and how to obtain confidential advice, counselling and treatment.

15.Monitoring quality

The Assistant Headteacher Personal Development and Catholic Life:

- Is responsible for monitoring the quality of teaching and learning for the subject.
- Will conduct subject assessments on a termly basis, which will include a mixture of the following:
- Work scrutiny
- Pupils and staff voice
- Learning walks
- Will create annual subject reports for the Headteacher and Governing board to report on the quality of the RSHE.
- Will work regularly and consistently with the headteacher and RSHE link governor, e.g. through regular review meetings, to evaluate the effectiveness of the subjects and implement any changes.

16. Monitoring and review

- This policy will be reviewed by the Headteacher in conjunction with the Assistant Headteacher and Governing body on an annual basis.
- Any changes needed to the policy, including changes to the programmes, will be implemented with the approval of the Headteacher.
- Any changes to the policy will be clearly communicated to all members of staff and, where necessary, parents and pupils, involved in the RSHE curriculum.
- The next scheduled review date for this policy is October 2026
